VISITOR ATTRACTIONS

WASHINGTON COUNTY COURTHOUSE completed in 1816 is the oldest west of the Appalachian Mountains. Located on Main and Cross Streets

FOOTPRINTS TO THE PARK is a 3 mile Walking Arboretum beginning at Cross Main, continuing east on Main to North Walnut through Springfield's Historic District and winding through Idle Hour Park, then back to town. This trail features historical sites and numerous trees that have been identified along the path. A brochure with the trail is available at Springfield City Hall or Springfield Opera House on Main Street

MT. ZION COVERED BRIDGE built in 1871-72 across the Little Beech Fork River (KY 458), National Register property

SAINT CATHARINE established in 1822, first community of Dominican Sisters in the United States; mother community of the order and home of St. Catharine College; US Hwy 150

ST. ROSE PRIORY founded in 1806, first Catholic educational institution west of the Alleghenies, students included Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederacy; Ky. Hwy 152. The church's architecture is Tudor, reflecting the English roots of St. Rose

LINCOLN HOMESTEAD STATE PARK 153-acre site includes house where Nancy Hanks lived, reproductions of Thomas Lincoln's boyhood cabin and the shop where he learned carpentry and cabinetmaking, and the Mordecai Lincoln home; KY Hwy 438

MAPLE HILL MANOR built in 1851, now bed and breakfast; National Register property; Perryville Road (US 150 East)
